LOCAL VALUE

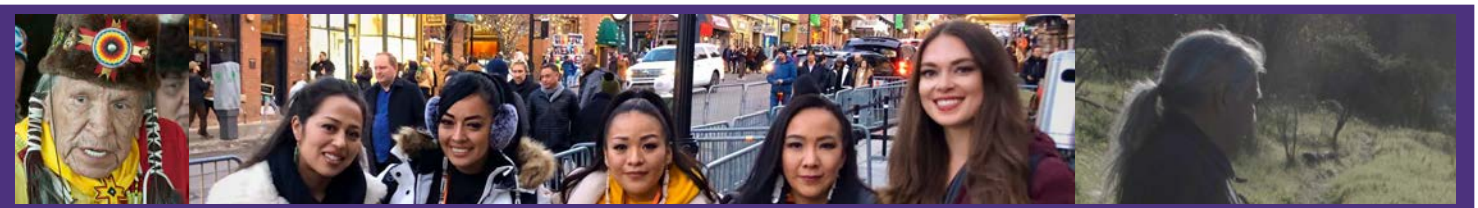

KEY SERVICES

Located in a powerfully diverse region that includes nearly 52.3 % Hispanic, 6.7 % African-American, 6.8 % Asian and 2 % Native American populations, KVCR aims to reflect the variety of cultures, traditions and interests that makes the Inland Empire so unique and vibrant. In 2021-2022 KVCR focused on our diversity initiative to expand programming to include Black Voice and IE Latino voices. KVCR actively develops and nourishes strong community relationships with our radio audience through local initiatives and events that celebrate the diversity, innovation and resilience of the Inland Empire.

LOCAL IMPACT

KVCR serves audiences throughout the Inland Empire and Southern California while bringing communities together through programming and outreach. We strive to make an impact in diversity that proportionally reflects our richly diverse region. With our FNX channel our “local impact” affects portions of twenty-six states reaching the Native and Indigenous communities.





REDLANDS BOWL SUMMER MUSIC FESTIVAL

Our long-time partnership with the Redlands Bowl Association continued this season. This summer was our 23th season of the Redlands Bowl Summer Music Festival. This community summer concert is the longest running outdoor free music festival.

This season opened with Grammy-award winner Debby Boone.



KVCR PRODUCES RADIO & TV SHOW SIMULTANEOUSLY

With COVID still affecting operations, KVCR doubled our efforts by producing content with maximum



efficiency. We placed two cameras in our radio production room that allowed us to conduct a television interview and re-purpose the interview for radio. A couple of the topics discussed included autism with actor Joe Montagna and his new Netflix series "As We See It" and gang tattoo removal with local physician.



We continued KVCR radio's public affairs show, *Inland Edition* to be included on the TV schedule.



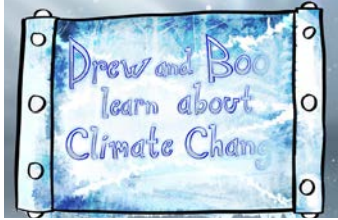
Inland Edition provided an opportunity to engage our television viewers with local content, at this point in the year we had very little local content, other than pledge. This season we covered topics that included Employment/Educational programs for those with development disabilities; Stuttering and the misconceptions and challenges; and Transportation with a focus on local airports and metro commuter train expansion.

Short Production

DREW & BOO SERIES CONTINUES

Produced a new episode of the Drew & Boo series, titled, “Drew and Boo Learn About Climate Change”. This is animated with narration and music. This segment was offered nationally to all public television stations. This is the 10th episode in the series, with a new story in the works for next year.



Drew and Boo love adventures, but when they learn about climate change, they want to take action. They talk to their teachers and research ways to help take care of the planet. From gardening to recycling and beyond, this duo loves to do their part to make the world a better place.



LAW ENFORCEMENT & AUTISM

This three-minute police training video was created to provide guidance for officers who may find themselves in a situation involving a person on the autism spectrum. In the video, Lillian Vasquez describes common behavior traits, which may include delayed language skills, avoiding eye contact, sensitivity to light, darting off, or becoming combative. The video offers tips to maintaining a peaceful situation, instructing the officers to give calm verbal instructions, ask simple questions, and connect using visual prompts. The video aired on KVCR TV and was presented in person at police stations in and around the Inland Empire region. This project was in partnership with the Autism Society Inland Empire.

A CAREER IN LOGISTICS

Working with the San Bernardino Workforce Development Department we produced three videos with stories and testimonials of individuals finding a career in the field of logistics. We produced three short segments and three 30-second PSAs with the focus on a career in Logistics. The focus is introducing the opportunities in our region for a career in logistics and manufacturing. Individuals share their stories including how they started, their background and where they are now. This career field had changed their lives for the better. The purpose of videos were designed for social media, broadcast and meeting presentations to encourage people to venture into this field. The project highlighted manufacturing plants and its traveling process. Logistics and the supply chain has grown and now it is one of the largest industry in our region with the local port of Long Beach.

YOUR STATION, YOUR STORY

At KVCR, we share stories of people, places, art, and inspiration throughout history and in our own lives. Working with our members we were able to tell their stories with our **Your Story, Your Station** project. We reached out to our members each month and presented a theme, including women in our lives, stories of autism, breast cancer awareness, and the great outdoors, to name a few. Members sent in a story relating to the month's theme and photos to support the narrative. The stories were edited into a slideshow that aired on KVCR TV, with a few stories also airing on radio. The stories were archived at kvcr.org/stories and shared with all members through our email newsletters.



Members shared how thrilled they were to be featured on KVCR. They commented that they were able to share special memories with friends and family, memorialize loved ones, raise awareness, and express gratitude. The **Your Story, Your Station** project has connected KVCR staff with KVCR members, strengthening community and capturing experiences that have shaped their lives.

HUNGER DOESN'T TAKE THE WEEKEND OFF

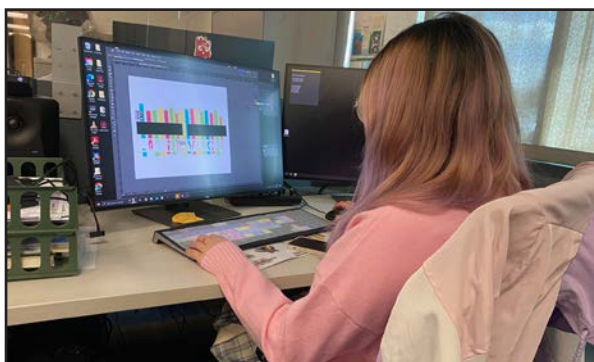
Food insecurity is a problem for many, especially low-income families. Many children are fed at school but on the weekends, they may often go hungry until the following Monday when they return to school. During the summer months, this can become an even bigger worry. As an outreach project, KVCR partnered with the United Way and our sister radio station 91.9 KVCR and launched a week-long campaign to provide Kids Packs filled with food that children can discreetly take home with them over the weekend. It's just another way of giving back to our community and the children right here in our own neighborhood. Instead of offering gifts of CDs or DVDs, we offered an opportunity to support children in our neighborhood.

Kimberly Starrs with Inland SoCal United Way, shared that their Kids Pack program feeds more than 2,000 children in grades K-8 each year across 12 different school districts. Students that participate in the kids pack program are identified by the school district and work with teachers and administration to ensure the privacy of students involved. Its important that nutritious snacks are included and available over the weekend when free meals are not available. So many of the kids in this program depend on those free meals that they receive at school and when the weekend comes, many children are hungry and many families are food insecure. Kids Pack is one way to help fill that need. Students that receive this kids pack often share the meals with their families.



STUDENTS WORK SIDE-BY-SIDE

KVCR works with students in many capacities. There are students working as interns at KVCR from San Bernardino Valley College, University of Redlands, and UC Riverside. They received hands-on experience in the studio, working on multiple productions and gaining professional experience. As the college semester ended, the KVCR television production staff had the chance for some interactions with students from the Film, Television, & Media classes held in the KVCR Studio. We provided an opportunity to work with the students to help increase their understanding of Studio Camera Operation, Live Green Screen Compositing, Special Effects Lighting, and more. We look forward to welcoming more students into the studio. One of the hands-on experience projects included the SBCCD Virtual Graduation Ceremonies. For the second year in a row the SBCCD has elected to record the virtual graduation ceremonies for SBVC and CHC in the KVCR studio. It was great to have the extra hands to set, run audio, teleprompter, and strike. Beyond college, KVCR was happy to welcome students from middle school to get a head start into career opportunities in media. On March 31, KVCR hosted 70 students on a tour of the TV and Radio studios. The middle school students were able to get a glimpse in the television and radio operations and what it's like to work in this industry.



STORY OF IMPACT

Serving an Underserved Community

Teaching Guidance, Acceptance, and Understanding in the Community

Standing by the diversity statement at KVCR, the autistic community is represented in many ways on KVCR. April is National Autism Awareness and Acceptance Month and in observance, we shared stories from our members about autism in their lives. We know individuals with autism have great skills, but face many challenges. This Your Story, Your Station topic

were stories of triumph, overcoming the odds, and family. Included in the stories were parents sharing the accomplishments of their children and individuals telling their own stories. But teaching autism acceptance is important year-round. We know dealing with a person causing a disturbance can be challenging and difficult. This type of situation may be amplified when the person has a disability or has special needs. KVCR's 3-minute police training video offers guidance for situations involving a person on the autism spectrum. First, it's important to recognize the person with autism is a person and has feelings or thoughts. Although each individual is different, certain behaviors may be common among autistic individuals. Common behavior traits may include delayed language skills, or that someone with autism may get rattled in a tense, unfamiliar situation and might act in seemingly abnormal ways. Behaviors may include dealing with tension by avoiding eye contact, covering their ears when stressed or overwhelmed by their environment like loud noises and bright lights, darting away from you, or even become combative. Keep in mind many autistic individuals may have speech difficulties or are nonverbal entirely. This can include someone who repeats what you say. Or someone who is very literal and may correct you. If an autistic person feels trapped in the situation, they might throw a tantrum or try coping with the stress by performing repetitive movements, to calm themselves down. Individuals with autism may even express themselves with laughing inappropriately.

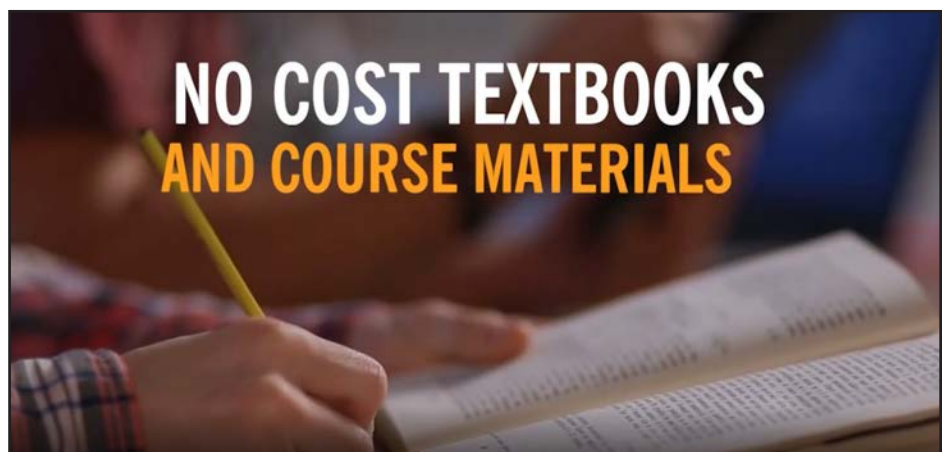


Textbooks Provided at No Cost

KVCR Team Up with County Schools to Produce Children's Show

This is a project in partnership with KVCR and the San Bernardino County Superintendent of Schools. Together we're creating a children's television series, titled Learn With Me. It is hosted by real teachers throughout the county. The target audience is children 1st through 3rd grade. Each episode will be recorded in English and Spanish. The plan is to make the series educational, entertaining, and engaging.



A Little Background About the Series

Each episode is live action and animated. It's a half hour show - the first 12 minutes will be shot in English and the second half will be shot in Spanish. The live action with the teachers is recorded in our studio in front of a green screen. The background is animated as well as other parts of the show, including items, images or words that pop up.



The teachers read a story, similar to what they might do in the classroom when reading to students. In each 12-minute segment, there



will be a Break out segment - some kind of activity that further demonstrates the episode's educational subject. At the end of the 12-minute segment there will be recap, a review of what we learned today, which will be done through "instant replays" and snippets from all the scenes throughout the episode.

We're excited to work with teachers and bring new children's content to our community.

FNX NOW A Weekly Half Hour News Show

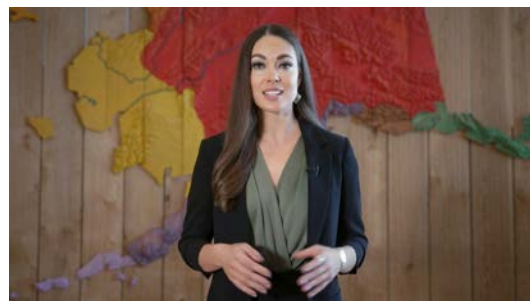


FNX PARTNERS WITH KVCR RADIO

Hoopa Valley: One Tribes Battle Against Covid19



When the Covid19 pandemic broke out in the U.S. in March of 2020, the impact across Native communities was fierce. FNX was at the forefront of providing these communities with direct information as it was published by trustworthy entities across the nation in an effort to combat the higher death and infection rates. It was important to provide current and factual information via Native health experts and doctors instead of relying on community outsiders as the faces and voices delivering the news. The hope was to help tribal communities bring down the infection and death rates within the Native population.

Hoopa Valley: One Tribes Battle Against Covid19

Native American communities across the country die from Covid19 at a rate 2.4 times higher than White non-Hispanics. This documentary highlights the work of the Hoopa Tribal Government, local medical experts from the K'ima:w medical center, Hoopa tribal radio station KIDE, and the Hoopa Office of Emergency Services. Those entities and community members continue to work hard to protect both tribal and non-tribal members of the Hoopa Valley community during the pandemic. As tribal nations experience high pandemic death tolls that number from hundreds to thousands, the Hoopa tribe has managed to keep the total death toll from Covid19 to 1.

September 30, 2021

Some of the FNX staff wear orange today, in honor of Orange Shirt day. Honoring the Indigenous children sent to residential schools. Orange Shirt Day (September 30) or Truth and Reconciliation Day is an annual event that "opens the door to global conversation on all aspects of Residential Schools. This day for survivors to be reaffirmed that they matter, and so do those that have been affected. Every Child Matters, even if they are an adult, from now on. The date was chosen because it is the time of year in which children were taken from their homes to residential schools, and because it is an opportunity to set the stage for anti-racism and anti-bullying policies for the coming school year. It is an opportunity for First Nations [and Native "Americans"], local governments, schools and communities to come together in the spirit of reconciliation and hope for generations of children to come." From Orangeshirtday.org. By 1926, nearly 83% of Native school-age children were attending boarding schools.
